- Regardless of individual course grades, students must maintain a minimum 2.00 cumulative GPA.
- Some colleges require a minimum GPA for major courses. Courses indicated in this column are included in the major GPA for this program of study.
- The [Carolina Core](#) provides the common core of knowledge, skill and academic experience for all Carolina undergraduate students.
- Students in the College of Arts and Sciences are required to demonstrate proficiency in one foreign language equivalent to the 122 course through course credit or the corresponding foreign language placement score. The foreign languages recommended for students majoring in philosophy are French, German, Greek, and Latin.
- Law, Ethics, and Society Concentration courses (18 hours):
 - Ancient Philosophy (3 hours): PHIL 301, 302, 303, 312, 313, 371
 - Modern Philosophy (3 hours): PHIL 304, 305, 310, 311, 372
 - Ethics (3 hours): PHIL 103, 211, 213, 320, 321, 322, 323, 324, 325, 514, 527
 - Legal, Political, or Social Philosophy (6 hours): PHIL 329, 330, 331, 334, 335, 370, 390, 531, 532
 - PHIL 201 or above (3 hours)
 - PHIL 500-level: The courses that fulfill this requirement may be used elsewhere in the major.
 - One writing-intensive course: PHIL 371, 372, 373 (The course that fulfills this requirement will be used elsewhere in the major. Students majoring in Philosophy are encouraged to take a writing-intensive course prior to taking PHIL 390.

Notes: Courses used to fulfill Carolina Core requirements may not also be used to fulfill major requirements. The Undergraduate Committee of the Philosophy Department, in consultation with the faculty member teaching the class, will determine whether PHIL 370 Special Topics and PHIL 390 Junior Seminar courses can be used in the Legal, Political, or Social Philosophy requirement.

- The College of Arts and Sciences requires one U.S. History and one non-U.S. History course, both of which must be chosen from the approved Carolina Core GHS courses. Whichever is not fulfilled through the Carolina Core GHS requirement must be fulfilled through this college requirement.
- The cognate is intended to support the course work in the major. The cognate must consist of twelve hours of courses at the advanced level, outside of, but related to the major. In place of a cognate, a student may choose a minor consisting of at least 18 credit hours of courses concentrated in one area that follow a structured sequence. A second major eliminates the minor/cognate requirement.
- Students majoring in Philosophy are encouraged to take PHIL 390 during the junior year, or before the final 30 hours of study. PHIL 390 fulfills the Field of Philosophy requirement within the Philosophy major. Students should plan to take PHIL 390 during their Junior year, or after 60 hours of study.
- No courses of a remedial, developmental, skill-acquiring, or vocational nature may apply as credit toward degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences. The College of Arts and Sciences allows the use of the Pass-Fail option on elective courses. Further clarification on inapplicable courses can be obtained from the College of Arts and Sciences.

Program Notes:

- ENGL 101 and ENGL 102 must be completed in the student's first 60 semester hours of work in order for these courses to be credited toward graduation.
- All undergraduate students must take a 3-credit course or its equivalent with a passing grade that covers the founding documents. This course may fulfill any requirement in the program of study. Courses that meet this requirement are listed in the academic bulletin.
- The Departmental Undergraduate Research Track is available to students majoring in Philosophy who wish to participate in significant research activities in collaboration with, or under the supervision of, a faculty mentor. In addition to the Philosophy major requirements, a student must complete the following: 1) PHIL 495 – Senior Thesis; 2) a minimum GPA of 3.50 in the major; 3) a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.30; 4) a public presentation of the Senior Thesis (at an annual meeting of the South Carolina Society for Philosophy, a regular or special session of the Philosophy Department Colloquium Series, USC Discovery Day, or submission to an undergraduate or a professional journal).
- The last 30 credit hours toward your degree must be earned in residence at the University of South Carolina-Columbia.
