The day provides a unique chance for alumni, students, faculty, staff and supporters to communicate the impact of USC's campuses on South Carolina's people, communities, industries and economic development to state legislators.

Among the USC System, supporters of the Palmetto College campuses at USC Lancaster, USC Salkehatchie, USC Sumter, USC Union and Palmetto College Columbia, as well as Palmetto College Online, showed the strength of USC Palmetto College and its impact on local communities across South Carolina.

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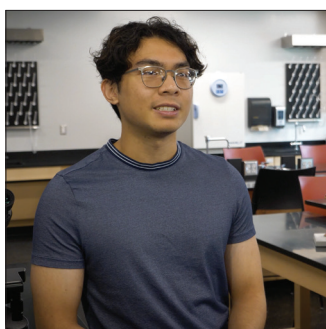
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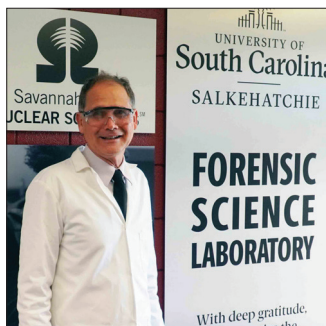
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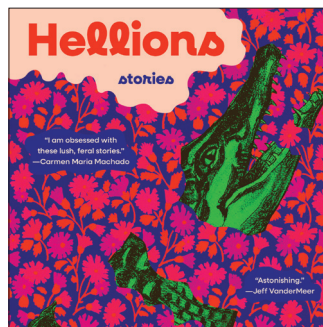
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Palmetto College: Celebrating the Past, Looking Forward to the Future

It is a privilege to be able to share with you an update (and highlights) for USC Palmetto College. Palmetto College mission of providing USC degrees that are accessible, affordable and flexible for all South Carolinians continues unabated!

We're exceedingly proud of the key accomplishments of the two-year Palmetto College Campuses led by our outstanding Deans.

USC Lancaster, led by Interim Dean Courtney Catledge, has celebrated their 65th anniversary this year, with a historic record fall 2024 enrollment of 2,592. Once again, they were ranked the No.1 two-year campus in South Carolina for the eighth year in a row by Niche.com, and the campus was recently awarded a \$2.8 Million grant to develop the USCL Center for Healthcare Workforce Development!



USC Salkehatchie, led by Dean April Cone, was recently awarded a \$1.9 Million grant by the U.S. Department of Energy's Office of Environmental Management for USC Salk DRIVES (Driving Rural Innovation into Visions of Employment in STEM) to launch a traveling STEM bus for K-12 students. A new state-of-the-art forensic chemistry laboratory opened at the Allendale Campus to provide hands-on experience in forensics-related workforce development, and Salk has secured approximately \$10.5 Million in federal grants, internal grants and philanthropic gifts since 2013.

USC Sumter, led by Interim Dean Eric Reisenauer, has increased enrollment over the past decade and reached a historic high enrollment milestone of over 1,800, with 1,804 in Fall 2024. The campus completed an \$11 Million renovation of the Science Building and announced the grand re-opening this year. USC Sumter

also received funding to construct a new \$33 Million facility in partnership with SCETV in the downtown Sumter area to house professional and collaborative bachelor's degree programs.

USC Union, led by Dean Randy Lowell, has experienced substantial growth in enrollment, from a headcount of 484 in Fall 2013, to record headcounts of 1,354 and 1,353, the past two fall semesters, nearly tripling enrollment over that time. USC Union has significantly

expanded the campus footprint, including numerous building renovations such as the new Nursing Simulation Laboratories Building, the Rippey Science and Nursing Building, along with many other facilities renovations. The campus also completed an ambitious new Campus Master Plan for the next 5-10 years (and beyond) as they celebrated the 60th anniversary since the campus opened with a single building in 1965.

Palmetto College Columbia, led by Dean Ron Cox, launched the Palmetto Pathway Program in Fall 2019, which experienced a 93% success rate with the 2023-24 cohort as 91 of 98 students were admitted to USC Columbia. The academic unit also executed a revised memorandum of understanding between Palmetto College Columbia and Fort Jackson to offer online bachelor's degree programs to military students on post and around the world. PC Columbia has also awarded more than \$45,000 in tuition assistance to 75 military students via the Robert V. Phillips Memorial Scholarship.

In addition to the outstanding work being done by our two-year Palmetto College campuses, we also collaborate with our excellent USC System partners at USC Aiken, USC Beaufort, USC Columbia and USC Upstate that provide students an opportunity to finish

not just an associate degree but also bachelor's degree completion programs that are offered both online and directly on our two-year campuses. Since the 2013 launch of Palmetto College Online, our list of degrees and offerings has grown from seven original programs to 38 programs in 2025.

Among our online bachelor's degree completion programs, Palmetto College has served 8,000 majors, enrolled 1,314 students this semester and we will have conferred over 4,000 degrees (over the past 12 years) once spring commencement concludes, with a projection of 4,126.

In addition, to meet the nursing workforce needs of our communities, we are very grateful for the on-campus BSN partnership programs with Columbia, Aiken and Beaufort, along with the online RN-BSN partnership with Upstate... that have resulted in over 1,300 BSN degrees awarded since 2013.

We are pleased to report that Palmetto College enrollment covers the entire Palmetto State, with every county represented among the 6,775 in-state majors, as well as 1,225 out-of-state majors (with the majority of out-of-state students being members of the United States Armed Forces).

As I conclude my 12-year tenure as Palmetto College chancellor, I reflect on our theme across Palmetto College this year: "Celebrating the Past, Looking Forward to the Future."

This theme seems apt as we have recently completed one strategic plan from the past few years and have launched our new strategic plan for the future. We have experienced many successes among the six goals outlined in our previous strategic plan, including the following highlights:

- **Enrollment Growth** of our Palmetto College campuses of 54% from 4,240 to 6,535 and our online partnership programs from 503 to 1,373 from Fall 2013 to Fall 2024.
- **Student Success Rate** increased from 58.4% to 70.5% from 2013 to 2024.

- **Faculty and Staff Excellence** highlights include the creation of a new Palmetto College Staff Senate and an increase in Sponsored Awards by our Faculty and Staff from \$1.34 Million to \$5.63 Million.
- **Commitment to Service** highlights include the creation of Food Pantries on each campus, along with the new iCarolina labs that provide community internet access at eight locations across South Carolina, with over 42,000 visits since inception.
- **Organizational and Financial Health** includes raising over \$20 Million in philanthropic gifts and distributing over \$164 Million across the USC System through the online partnership programs.
- **Strategic Planning** – the new Strategic Plan for 2024-2025 – 2028-2029 was developed and launched on July 1, 2024.


As we have been "Looking Forward to the Future" with the launch of that new strategic plan, the six top priorities in alignment with the USC Columbia plan have placed us in a good place for continued future growth. Enrollment growth continues, student success rate has continued to increase, total research expenditures have increased, budgets are on target to be balanced with 2-3 months fund balance for all campuses, and we have already exceeded our goal for dollars raised.

In conclusion, I would like to express my gratitude to President Amiridis, the members of the USC Board of Trustees and our USC System partners for their role in the creation and continued success of Palmetto College and for the opportunity to serve students and communities across our great state!

2024-25 Palmetto College Excellence Awards honor individual faculty teaching, service and scholarship

Each spring, the **Palmetto College Campuses Faculty Excellence Awards** for teaching, scholarship and service are announced, and awarded by the Palmetto College Campuses Faculty Senate.

The **John J. Duffy Excellence in Teaching Award for Palmetto College Campuses** has been presented annually since 2009 to a faculty member who exemplifies excellence in dedication and commitment to students and their academic success inside and outside of the classroom.



This year's recipient of the John J. Duffy Excellence in Teaching Award for Palmetto College Campuses is **Susan Cruise**, associate professor of sociology at USC Lancaster. She earned a Ph.D. in sociology from

Texas Woman's University.

Her compassionate and student-centered approach to teaching has prepared her students to become thoughtful and empathetic global citizens.

In May 2022, Dr. Cruise, along with Dr. Angela Neal, led a transformative study abroad trip to Eastern Europe, which included a visit to the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp.

They not only provided an enriching educational experience but also demonstrated a profound commitment to service by raising nearly \$20,000 to ensure all students could partake in this invaluable opportunity.

As part of the course, the class brought 28 large suitcases filled with donations for war-displaced refugees, with numerous contributions raised by the Lancaster community.

Beyond her role as an educator, Professor Cruise is a devoted mentor who actively empowers her students. Thanks to her mentorship, a Lancaster student received a mini-Magellan grant of \$1,000 for her project

"Addressing Food Insecurity Among Students at the University Of South Carolina Lancaster."

Dr. Cruise fosters an atmosphere of mutual respect that encourages students to express their opinions, facilitating critical thinking and expanding their world view.

She states, "When the classroom environment is welcoming and students feel their opinion is valued, they are more open to learning from the perspective of others—even if those viewpoints are different from their own."

Cruise's dedication to teaching and her innovative approaches in the classroom have made a significant impact on her students and colleagues.

The **Chris P. Plyler Excellence in Service Award for Palmetto College Campuses** is presented to a faculty member who personifies excellence in extraordinary service to the campus, university, community and profession. The award was first given in 2015.



The Chris P. Plyler Excellence in Service Award for Palmetto College Campuses has been awarded to **Bettie Obi Johnson**, professor of chemistry at USC Lancaster. She earned a Ph.D. in analytical

chemistry from Georgia Institute of Technology.

Professor Johnson's service work encompasses all four areas: campus, system, community, and professional.

Her impact is evident in her extensive contributions to faculty governance. She has played a vital role in

shaping policies and initiatives through her service on the Palmetto College Faculty Senate, where she has also chaired the Faculty Welfare Committee.

Additionally, she has served on numerous campus committees, including Tenure and Promotion, Athletics Advisory, Student Scholarship, and Native American Studies—demonstrating her unwavering commitment to faculty and student success.

A devoted mentor and advisor, Dr. Johnson advises second-year students with majors in chemistry, biochemistry, pre-pharmacy, and engineering. Her dedication is reflected in the success of her advisees—over the past four years, 9 of her advisees have been admitted into pharmacy schools.

Professor Johnson has also served as a sponsor of the USC Lancaster Chemistry Club, which provides opportunities for students to socialize, learn, and network. Her mentorship has left a lasting impression, as reflected in the words of the club's president who states, "Through Chemistry Club, I have witnessed her love of knowledge, dedication to the university, and enjoyment of helping others."

Professor Johnson's commitment to expanding opportunities for students goes even further. She has been instrumental in bringing the SC LEND program to the Lancaster campus, a federally funded initiative that prepares future professionals to work with individuals with developmental disabilities. Thanks to her efforts, Lancaster seniors can now engage with SC LEND leaders and participate in hands-on clinical experiences.

Her passion for education also extends into the community. As an Upward Bound instructor, she has designed creative lab experiments that cover essential chemistry concepts in a fun and engaging way.

Fostering an early interest in science, Dr. Johnson has also inspired young learners through hands-on experiments at local elementary schools during

Community Career Day.

Professor Johnson's professional service is equally impressive. She has served as a session judge and moderator for the South Carolina Academy of Science, the Southeastern Regional Meeting of the American Chemical Society, and for Discover USC.

Further highlighting her dedication to advancing scientific knowledge, she has been a peer reviewer for esteemed journals, including the Journal of Chemical Education, Chemistry Africa, and Plant-Environment Interactions.

Johnson's exceptional service and contributions to the college community have been invaluable.

The Denise R. Shaw Excellence in Scholarship Award for Palmetto College Campuses, first given in 2017, is presented annually to a faculty member who exhibits outstanding scholarly research or creative achievement.



The Denise R. Shaw Excellence in Scholarship Award for Palmetto College Campuses goes to **F. Evan Nooe**, assistant professor of history at USC Lancaster and historian for the Native American Studies Center at USCL. He earned a Ph.D. in United States history from the University of Mississippi.

As one would expect for the recipient of the Shaw Award, Professor Nooe's scholarly achievements are quite impressive.

His book, *Aggression and Sufferings: Settler Violence, Native Resistance, and the Coalescence of the Old South*, has received prestigious recognition, earning the Anne B. and James B. McMillan Prize and the 2024 Best Book Award from the National History Honor Society, Phi Alpha Theta. These accolades are a testament to the significance of his work.

In addition to his book, Dr. Nooe has published in esteemed, peer-reviewed journals. His article, "It's in the Blood: Settler Family Memories of Native Violence in the American South" was featured in *History & Memory*, a high-impact, international journal. Another article, "Making Florida History at Disney Springs: Florida's Past as Themed Tourism" appeared in the *International Journal of Disney Studies*, further highlighting his breadth of research.

Professor Nooe's dedication to scholarly work is also evident by the acquisition of numerous grants, including USC's Research Initiative for Summer Engagement (RISE) Grant and USC Lancaster's Research and Productive Scholarship mini-Grant.

And Dr. Nooe's contributions to the field of history continue to grow. He has several scholarly works in progress, including his forthcoming book, *Florida Reveries: The Three Histories of Walt Disney World's Disney Springs and the Re-Creation of Florida's Past*.

Additionally, he is serving as co-editor for the upcoming book, *More than Lost Causes: Settler and Indigenous Memory in the American South* for which he is also writing an article entitled, "Consecrating the Hampton Massacre: Native Resistance, Settler Memory, and the Coalescence of South Carolina."

Dr. Nooe's extraordinary scholarship and dedication to research have greatly enriched our academic community, and Palmetto College is truly privileged to have such an extraordinary scholar among us.

She has also been awarded a 2025 Excel grant through the Office of the Vice President for Research for her work, titled “The Puzzle: A New Musical.”

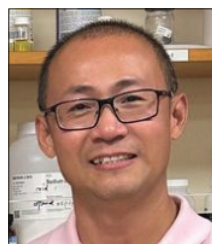

Jill Castiglia, senior instructor of chemistry at USC Lancaster; Fernanda Burke, chair of the Division of Math, Science,

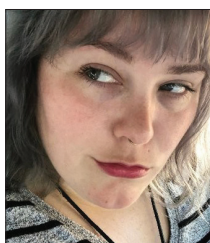

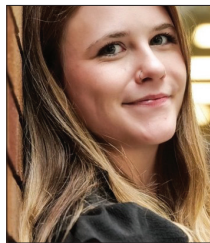

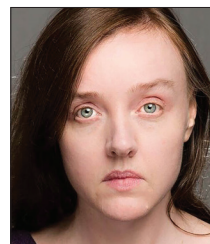


Chris Defossez, assistant professor of psychology at USC Sumter, is the 2023-24 recipient of the USC Sumter

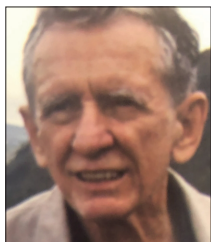

extended illness. He was 88.

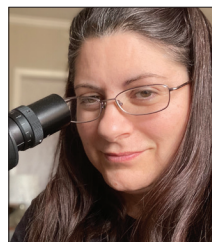

From Fire Ant to Fulbright

USC Sumter alum Denzyl Josh Lastimoso
awarded lucrative Fulbright Scholarship

Denzyl Josh Lastimoso, 2021 USC Sumter alumni, was recently awarded a Fulbright Scholarship to study Master of Research in Cardiovascular Sciences at Newcastle University, UK.

Lastimoso was born in the Philippines, but his family immigrated to the United States when he was four years old and settled in Sumter. He attended Sumter public schools and graduated from Sumter High School in 2019.

At first, Lastimoso wasn't sure where he wanted to go to college or what he wanted to study, but scholarships and his proximity to USC Sumter helped sway him to become a Fire Ant. Once enrolled, he began taking general education courses, but that all changed when he took Introduction to Statistical Reasoning.

In that class, he met USC Sumter Assistant Professor of Mathematics Dr. Sher Chhetri, who encouraged him to participate in a student research project. The project was a statistical analysis, and the findings were later applied to analyze data relating to bladder cancer patients.

"Josh showed an interest in medical research when I first met him in my statistics class in Fall 2019. He exhibited an extensive background in mathematics and statistics, enthusiasm, and dedication. Because of this, it better prepared him to work with a new probability distribution model and later the model was applied to cancer patients' data," said Dr. Chhetri.

That research experience started Lastimoso down the path to his future goal of becoming a physician-researcher.

"At USC Sumter, I found a passion for research through the guidance of Dr. Chhetri. There, I formed a strong interest in discovery for the biological sciences. Because of that opportunity, I've grown as an individual and have been taking steps to develop my career as a physician-researcher," said Lastimoso.

While Lastimoso was at USC Sumter, he and Dr. Chhetri completed two research projects, "Mathematical Characterization of Lomax Distribution," which was presented and published in the Proceedings of the 16th Annual SC Upstate Research Symposium, and "Extended Lomax Distribution with an Application to Cancer Patient Data," which was published in the Future of Information and Communication Conference. They also presented their findings at the 2021 South Carolina Academy of Sciences Meetings.

Due to his hard work and dedication, Lastimoso was named the Mathematics, Science and Engineering Outstanding Student in 2021. He graduated USC Sumter with an Associate in Science degree, and he went on

earn a Bachelor of Science degree from USC Columbia in 2022. Once Josh graduated, he was hired at Lexington Medical Center in Columbia as a pathology support technician.

After working nearly two years, Lastimoso decided it was time to take the next step in his educational career. He began to look for Master degree programs that would nurture and expand his passion for medical research. The Fulbright Scholarship program was the perfect fit for Lastimoso's goals, but it would be a challenge to land the lucrative scholarship.

According to their website, "The Fulbright Program, the United States government's flagship program of international educational and cultural exchange, offers passionate and accomplished students and scholars in more than 160 countries the opportunity to study, teach, conduct research, exchange ideas, and contribute to mutual understanding. These talented Fulbrighters from all backgrounds inspire, innovate, and contribute to finding solutions to challenges facing our communities and our world."

Lastimoso completed the extensive application and interview process and in mid-2024 he learned he had been awarded the scholarship and would have the opportunity to study in the United Kingdom at Newcastle University and work towards a Master of Research in Cardiovascular Sciences.

"I was thrilled to hear Josh received a Fulbright scholarship to study in the UK. It is an honor to be a part of his success story. For a teacher/educator, it is a great joy to help others and see them succeed," said Dr. Chhetri.

Lastimoso finished his first semester at Newcastle this Fall (2024) and has enjoyed his experience thus far. "I've had a wonderful experience. I've met lots of great people from different backgrounds and it's been fascinating to talk directly with people from around the world. Despite the weather, I've warmed up to Newcastle, and I would happily call it a new home. From the local shops to the variety of food, my time in Newcastle has been nothing short of fantastic," said Lastimoso.

Lastimoso added, "I want to thank Dr. Chhetri for introducing me to the world of research in statistics throughout my undergraduate education at USC Sumter. Without this experience, I'm not sure if I would've pursued a research-oriented career. I'm also grateful to USC Sumter for having a welcoming environment and for giving me support as I advanced through my later years of undergrad."

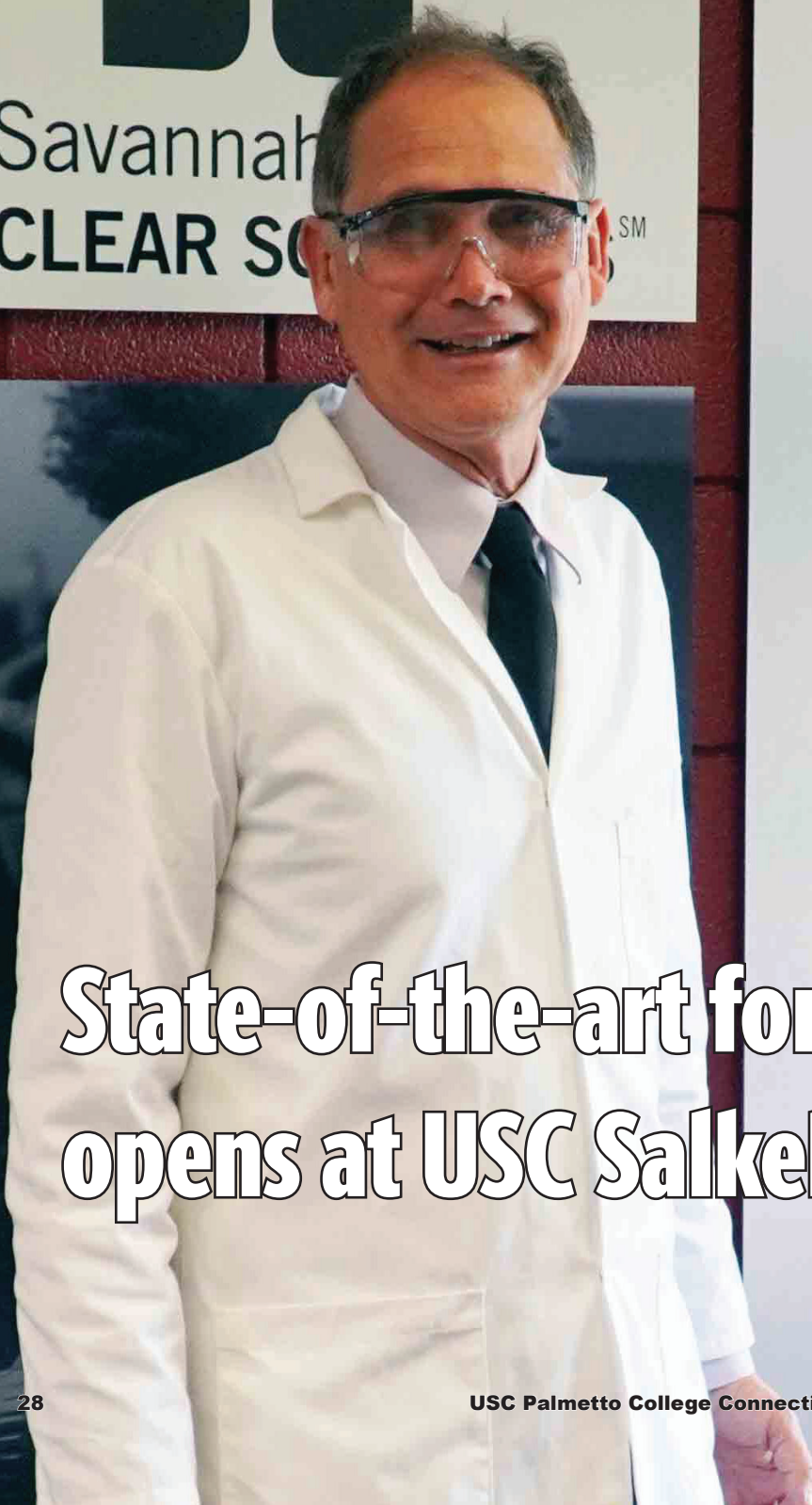

USC Salkehatchie celebrated the opening of a new forensic science lab at its Allendale campus, marking a significant advancement in criminal justice education in the Lowcountry. The state-of-the-art facility will provide students with hands-on experience in fingerprinting, drug testing, DNA analysis, and other crucial forensic techniques. The lab, a culmination of years of planning and collaboration, is poised to enhance the education of current students, attract future students to the criminal justice program, and further the university's mission of providing higher education and intellectual leadership to the region.

"This lab represents a significant milestone for our criminal justice program," said Dr. Francis Burns, a chemistry professor at Salkehatchie, who initially proposed the lab. "By offering students real-world experience in forensic science, we hope to inspire and prepare them for successful careers in law enforcement and the criminal justice system. We've already seen the impact in our classrooms, with students inspired to pursue careers in forensics and criminal justice."

The lab's creation was a collaborative effort.

"This project would not have come to fruition without the work of so many people," said April Cone, dean at USC Salkehatchie. "Dr. Francis Burns was instrumental in developing the concept of a forensic chemistry lab on our campus. He worked closely with John Peek, instructor of criminal justice, as well as Chris DeWolf, our Palmetto College senior director of development, and many others to research the possibilities, develop a plan, secure funding, and implement the installation of

the equipment. It truly has been a team effort which has resulted in an impressive final product. We are deeply grateful for the support of community partners, our local law enforcement agencies, and the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division (SLED)."

Funding for the project was secured by USDA grants, along with matching funds from community partners including Savannah River Nuclear Solutions, Enterprise Bank, The Parker Group, the SC Bar Association, Southern Carolina Alliance, SRS Community Reuse Organization, and the Harvin Law Firm.

The lab will not only enhance USC Salkehatchie's academic programs, but it will also provide opportunities for the community.

"USC Salkehatchie is committed to improving our region," Burns said. "This lab will be a valuable resource in those efforts, allowing us to provide opportunities for the public to learn more about forensic science."

The event was attended by donors, government officials, law enforcement representatives, faculty, staff, and students. SLED was recognized for its support of the program, including providing opportunities for students to visit SLED facilities and learn about crime scene documentation and evidence collection.

"USC Salkehatchie's focus is on serving our students, our community, and the state. We truly appreciate your support of this continuous effort," Cone said. "Your presence today illustrates your belief in the future of this institution and our students."

Netherlands soccer player Pien Coppoolse had never set foot in the United States – before she headed to the USC Lancaster in July 2024 to join its women's soccer team.

Now, the freshman Dutch midfielder is making her mark on and off the soccer field in Lancaster.

She's already delivered in big moments, helping the team to achieve its best-ever season record – 14-3-1 – and the Region X title for the second consecutive year.

Assistant coach Joseph Calbreath remembers a key moment in the season that solidified Coppoolse's pivotal place in the midfield.

"Her goal from outside the box against Southwest Virginia was a huge boost to her confidence," he said. "It let her showcase exactly what she's capable of."

Assistant coach Michael Smith recalled another dramatic moment. This one came during a 2-1 win over Johnson & Wales, where Coppoolse calmly converted a last-minute penalty.

"That's just the kind of player she is," Smith said.

Head coach Kenny Halas recruited Coppoolse through Kings Talent — an agency he trusts for recruiting international players. For Halas, recruiting international players is vital for the team's success.

"American players tend to play soccer, while international players live it," Halas said. "They see soccer as a lifestyle, not just a sport."

Coppoolse's highlight video captured this intensity.

"She celebrated like she'd won the World Cup after a corner kick," Halas said. "That moment showcased her competitive spirit and commitment."

Born in Amsterdam and raised in Breda, Coppoolse started playing soccer at age 7, inspired by her younger brother. But her journey was not without challenges. Coppoolse faced sexism as she played against local boys teams.

"Playing against boys was a huge learning experience," she said. "Most didn't believe girls could play football (soccer)."

But her technical ability allowed her to silence critics.

"There was a boy who was especially rude about playing against a team of girls," Coppoolse said. "After I scored three goals against him, he was quiet."

Dutch soccer emphasizes technical skill over raw athleticism, and Coppoolse credits this style for shaping her game. Her left foot style, her vision and her precise passing have made her a key playmaker in USCL's attack, with seven goals and seven assists in just 17 games.

Smith noticed her ability to make an impact on the program the day she arrived in Lancaster.

"She's a creative and talented player," he said. "She's relentless and dedicated in practice, consistently showing up, not only for herself but also for the team."

On the field, she plays with a European style — calm, technical and composed. Sophomore defender Malaya Fuller has found inspiration in Coppoolse's style of play and work ethic.

"She's an extremely technical player who can hold the ball longer and pick out the perfect pass," Fuller said. "She's inspired me to work on my shot."

Team captain and fellow Dutch midfielder Julie Eskes praised Coppoolse for her versatility.

"Being left-footed, but also able to shoot exceptionally with her right foot makes her unique," Eskes said.

Her leadership extends beyond the field. With a 3.85 GPA, Coppoolse balances academics and athletics, aiming to graduate early with a liberal arts degree.

"My dad always told me, 'Chase your dreams, no matter where they take you,'" Coppoolse said. "Their support from across the world keeps me going."

As the team looks ahead to the spring season, Coppoolse's goal remains clear — to help lead USCL to new heights.

"We achieved so much this season, but we're not done yet," Coppoolse said. "I want the team to be nationally ranked, and I'll give everything to help achieve this!"

Pharoh Cooper, '22, and Mandy Moses, '25

Within Palmetto College Columbia, the stories of our alumni are a testament to the power of perseverance, dedication and the transformative impact of education. The remarkable journeys of two alumni – Mandy Moses and Pharoh Cooper – and their experiences reflect the diverse paths our students take and the profound influence of Palmetto College on their lives.

Mandy Moses: A Journey of Resilience and Transformation

Mandy Moses graduated high school in 1997, intending to take a gap year. That gap year extended to 23 years, during which Mandy faced numerous challenges, including becoming a single mother and working full-time in the medical field. It wasn't until the spring of 2021, at the age of 41, that Moses enrolled in her first college course at Cleveland Community College in Shelby, N.C.

Initially aiming for a nursing career, Moses' plans shifted due to the stress and changes in the healthcare profession during the COVID-19 pandemic. She decided to pursue a business-oriented role within the medical field, driven by her passion for oncology and improving healthcare systems. Mandy completed her associate's degree in 2022 and continued her education at Palmetto College, enrolling in the Organizational Leadership program in 2023.

Her Palmetto College experience has been transformative, with significant influences from professors like Dr. Andrew Kettler (USC Union), Dr. Deborah Hudson (USC Union), Dr. R. Mac Jones (Palmetto College Columbia), and Dr. Melissa Rack (USC Salkehatchie). Moses engaged in research projects and service learning, contributing to her growth and development. Supported by her husband and the Harriet Hurt Endowed Scholarship, Mandy's journey has been marked by resilience and a commitment

to making meaningful changes in healthcare.

"She (Harriet Hurt) started at age 47," said Moses. "She got her bachelor's degree, her master's degree. And she became a key figure in the Palmetto program. I felt this deep connection to Harriet at that point. Because even though I wasn't dealing with students, I'm dealing with patients. And I'm attempting to do the same thing, to give people opportunities where they feel like those opportunities don't exist."

Moses will graduate from the University of South Carolina on May 10, 2025. Looking ahead, she plans to pursue the Master of Studies in Law degree in health systems law from the Joseph F. Rice School of Law at the USC to more effectively advocate for patients.

"It just has, year after year, went down. And it's become less focused on patient care and more about the bureaucracies within health care systems and organizations. And I just don't like that," said Moses. "My goal when I'm done with this is to try to make changes within those systems. If I'm a powerful enough person to do that, to be sure that patients can focus on their disease processes and not have to worry about all this junk behind the scenes. 'Can I pay for my chemo? Do we have food at home? Can I get a ride to my chemo?' Things like that. I just feel like we can do better."

She believes her education has been the best investment in her personal growth and encourages other adult learners to pursue their educational goals.

Pharoh Cooper: Balancing Football and Academics

Pharoh Cooper grew up in Havelock, N.C. Success as a high school athlete led him to commit to the USC in his junior year of high school, enrolling in 2013. Under Coach Steve Spurrier, Pharoh had a successful freshman year and gained attention from the NFL during his sophomore year.

As his football career progressed, Cooper began dropping classes to focus on training and eventually left college early when he was drafted to play for the Los Angeles Rams. Despite his success in the NFL, injuries prompted him to reconsider his education. In 2018, Pharoh reached out to Maria Hickman, his advisor, and decided to return to USC through Palmetto College, which offered online classes.

"I always made a promise to my dad. I said, I'll go back and get my degree. And he was always saying, it's better to have it. It's better to have it than to need it than to not have it."

Balancing football and academics was challenging, but Cooper persevered with the help of tutors and support from Palmetto College. He changed his major to Liberal Studies, with a minor in Criminal Justice, and steadily worked towards completing his degree.

"It was tough, it was very tough trying to balance football, meetings, traveling, doing work, [and] assignments due at midnight," said Cooper.

Walking across the stage at Colonial Life Arena in 2022 and receiving his Liberal Studies degree was one of the best feelings he ever experienced. Cooper emphasizes the importance of education and the support he received from Palmetto College, encouraging others to pursue their degrees despite challenges. He is proud to be a Gamecock alumnus and appreciates the opportunities provided by USC.

The stories of Mandy Moses and Pharoh Cooper highlight the diverse paths our students take and the profound impact of Palmetto College on their lives. Palmetto College Mace debuts

Sculptor Bob Doster designed new symbol of authority for formal academic occasions

Officially adopted in May 2025, the Palmetto College Mace was designed and fashioned by [Bob Doster](#), an award-winning, nationally acclaimed artist based in Lancaster, S.C.

The steel mace is nearly four feet long. Its head features four gold medallions that display a stylized University of South Carolina Palmetto College logo, a list of the Palmetto College campuses with founding dates, the Seal of the State of South Carolina and the University of South Carolina seal surrounded by a laurel wreath. In academia, the laurel wreath symbolizes victory, triumph and achievement, particularly in intellectual pursuits.

The mace is topped by a palmetto tree (Sabal palmetto), which holds great significance in South Carolina history as the official state tree and which symbolizes the state's resilience and victory during the American War of Independence. Three of the medallions include the palmetto tree in their design, and the fourth features an outline of South Carolina, which has been nicknamed the "Palmetto State." Like the palmetto logs that absorbed cannon fire at Fort Moultrie in 1776, Palmetto College students are resilient, and the durable steel mace design honors their academic accomplishments.

The Palmetto College Mace is carried in procession during formal academic occasions, such as commencements and convocations, signifying the authority of the university. The placement of the mace on its stand signals that the proceedings are about to come to order. The retirement of the mace indicates the conclusion of the exercises. When University of South Carolina President Michael Amiridis is present at a formal Palmetto College academic event, the University of South Carolina Mace takes the place of the Palmetto College Mace.

The University of South Carolina Mace was officially adopted in 1967, and new maces for the four-year comprehensive USC System institutions at USC Aiken, USC Beaufort and USC Upstate were adopted in 2024.



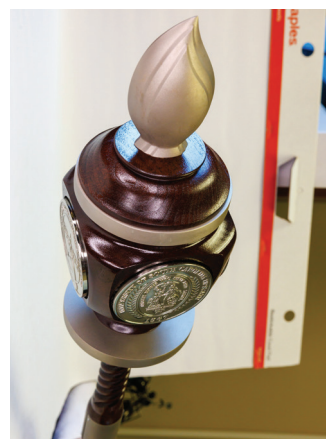
The USC Mace, officially adopted in 1967, was designed and fashioned by distinguished London silversmith Leslie Durbin.
